

Primavera Monarrez Named 10th President of Porterville College



After a nationwide search and competitive process, Porterville College and the Kern Community College District (KernCCD) announced the selection of Primavera Monarrez as the next President of Porterville College. Ms. Monarrez most recently served as the college's Interim President. Her appointment to the permanent role is a testament to her dedication and the positive impact she has made throughout the campus community.

"President Monarrez will lead Porterville College into a future built on student results: more completions, more transfers with junior standing, and more industry-recognized credentials that lead to good local jobs. As the trustee representing the Porterville College area, I'm focused on what this means on a practical level. Under her leadership, we will deepen partnerships with employers and universities, align programs to regional opportunities and ensure that every student, whether coming straight from high school or returning to upskill, can see a clear, supported path to success," said John Corkins, the President of the Kern Community College District Board of Trustees.

A proud Central Valley native, first-generation college student, and product of the California community college system, Ms. Monarrez brings over 20 years of experience in higher education leadership. She deeply understands students' challenges and aspirations and is dedicated to advancing student success while ensuring higher education remains responsive to student and regional needs.

Since assuming the role of Interim President in July 2024, Ms. Monarrez has led Porterville College with a focus on transparency, inclusion, and collaboration. This has led to significant momentum across key institutional priorities. Under her direction, Porterville College has strengthened enrollment, expanded dual enrollment programs to benefit K-12 students, addressed critical facility needs, and enhanced participatory governance. She has also advanced the college's efforts to improve access, persistence, and regional economic mobility for students in Tulare County.

Prior to her interim role, Ms. Monarrez was Vice President of Student Services at Porterville College and Dean of Student Success at Taft College. Her earlier leadership experience includes roles at Bakersfield College and CSU Bakersfield. She has secured competitive grants, improved accreditation processes, and built strong partnerships with K-12 schools, universities, and community organizations.

Ms. Monarrez holds a BA in Sociology and an MS in Counseling/Student Affairs from CSU Bakersfield and is currently pursuing a doctorate. She is deeply committed to the Central Valley, Tulare County, and Porterville communities.

Kern Community College Chancellor Dr. Steven Bloomberg expressed his excitement over the appointment,

Following a rigorous national search that drew an exceptionally strong pool of candidates, Primavera Monarrez rose to the top of a highly competitive process. The PC Art Gallery Presents: The Cigarette Box Project



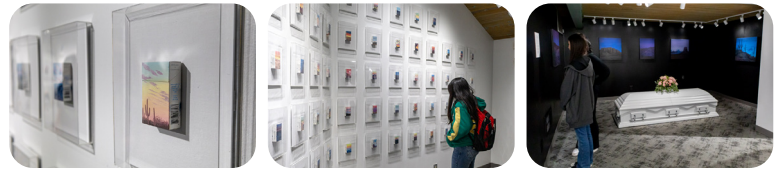
This month, the PC Art Gallery featured the work of Artist and PC art professor Angel Lesnikowski for the opening of The Cigarette Box Project, a haunting look at themes of foresight, the desert, and death - using cigarette boxes as the primary medium. Angel Lesnikowski's paintings blend emotional clarity with formal precision, balancing the urgency of lived experience with rigorous composition. Her practice is deeply committed to truth-telling—exploring themes of erasure, feminism, and identity—while equally embracing joy, beauty, and refuge. This orientation allows her compelling and accessible work to inhabit a space of both critique and inquiry.

This exhibition offers a deeply personal meditation on memory, inheritance, and mortality, centered around Angel Lesnikowski: The Cigarette Box Project. Through painting, installation, and mixed media, Lesnikowski transforms discarded objects and personal history into intimate reflections on fear and remembrance.

The core of the project features hundreds of hand-painted cigarette boxes depicting desert landscapes. These vistas symbolize both beauty and threat, drawing from her father's life as a desert cowboy and her mother's Middle Eastern upbringing. Each box becomes a small vessel of memory, connecting individual experience to cultural loss and the story of stolen land.

Lesnikowski's works meditate on resilience and the fragile negotiations of living. She extends a lineage of landscape painting, where the scene is a site of metaphysical encounter, akin to Caspar David Friedrich. By choosing discarded cigarette boxes as her substrate, she brings this tradition into the present, reflecting the conditions of the Anthropocene—where consumption, extraction, and waste are entangled with the landscapes we inherit. Transforming refuse into images of beauty and memory, Lesnikowski reveals how the fragile, the disposable, and the sublime are part of the same world.

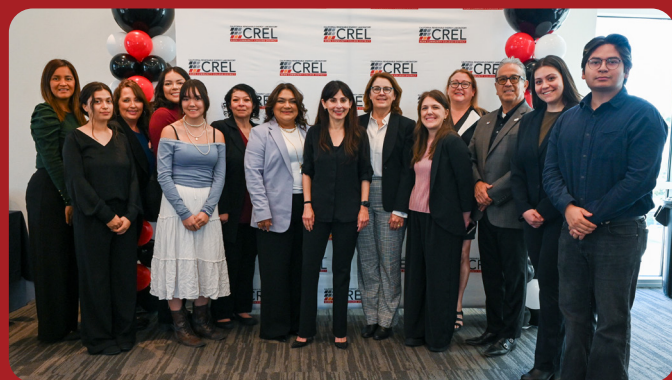
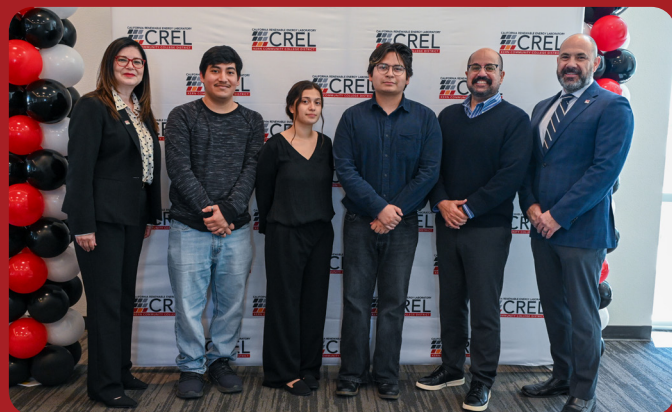
